

Ohio Constitution mandates that the General Assembly create, maintain and fund a "thorough and efficient system of common schools throughout the state; but no religious or other sect.. shall control of, any part of the school funds of this state."

A PUBLIC SYSTEM SERVES THE PUBLIC

- FREE
- Open to every school aged child
- Available in every corner of the state
- Nonsectarian
- Nonpartisan
- Benefits the whole community not just the individual
- Serves the Common Good



PUBLIC SYSTEM PROTECTS TAXPAYERS

- Governed by locally elected boards of education who are accountable to the public
 - Provide oversight and reflect community values
 - Fiduciary responsibility
 - Authorized to put tax levies on the ballot
- Sunshine laws support transparency in all policy decisions including budget decisions
- Funds subject to audits


SCHOOL FUNDING: A STATE & LOCAL PARTNERSHIP

- State responsibility defined in Constitution Part of state budget
- Ohio's school districts make up the state education system. Share responsibility for school funding.
- Core principle of state funding: State contribution compensates for differences in a school district's ability to fund its schools so that all students have access to basic resources needed for a quality education.
- The state contribution is driven by how much the local district can contribute to the base cost.
- State track record is dismal and getting worse.

DeRolph lawsuit established state funding is inadequate and inequitable

- 550 Districts filed suit in 1992 and won in 1997 decision by the Ohio Supreme Court
- State contribution was inadequate not based on real costs.
- Insufficient state funds results in over-reliance on property taxes.
- Property taxes create vast differences in funding because of difference in the capacity of communities to fund their schools.
- The on-going challenge: how provide equal opportunity to students and fair burden on local communities.

Fair School Funding Plan: Almost but Not Yet

Bipartisan proposal first introduced in 2018 as a free-standing bill.

Overwhelming support in House – killed by senate finance.

Key Features:

- Based on actual cost not residual satisfies adequacy requirement
- Improves accuracy of evaluating local capacity by including property wealth and income.
- Categoricals increase per person spending on gifted, disadvantaged, students with disabilities, and English learners
- Assigned voucher costs to state budget not local school districts

FAIR SCHOOL FUNDING:

LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

- Introduced as part of state budget approved in 2021
- Proposal approved as part of budget two years only
- Funding amounts to be increased by one-third over three budget cycles.
- No guarantee that future steps would be approved.
- Increase in public school spending traded for voucher expansion
- Second step approved in 2023 budget with updated cost numbers.
- Increase traded for universal vouchers
- Third step approved in 2025 in name only.
- Used updated property wealth numbers but 2022 cost data.
- · Almost all districts lost funds.

THE UNFINISHED CHALLENGE:

Equal opportunity for students and a fair burden on local communities

- State funding remains inadequate and inequitable.
- LOCAL share has hit all time HIGH.
- Supermajority unwilling to represent the interests of their constituents and 1.5 million public school students. They are enchanted with choice.
- Instead of increasing investment in public education and lifting the local burden they: increased spending on vouchers; ignored Fair School Funding basics; cut income taxes and started fiddling with property taxes in fake remedy.

SIDE QUEST: VOUCHERS

Billions of dollars for 10% of students

90% of Ohio students attend public schools.

Ohio has 5 voucher programs:

- EdChoice
- Cleveland
- Autism
- Jon Peterson
- EdChoice Expansion

The two most expensive - EdChoice and EdChoice Expansion - cost the state a combined total of \$353 million in the 2022-23 school year. And close to \$1 Billion in 2023-24

Families can receive up to \$8,408 for the EdChoice voucher from the state per student, with no cap for income.

- 94% of the 131 fact sheets are indicating a higher number of non-low income families utilizing the EDchoice voucher program
- 92% of the completed voucher fact sheets of the 53 districts that have upcoming levies on the November ballot are also showing a higher number of non-low income families utilizing the EDChoice voucher program.





UNDERSTANDING SCHOOL FINANCE TERMS

- Mill Unit value used for assessing property taxes in Ohio. It is .001 of a dollar, a milli-dollar.
- **Reduction Factor** this is the process of lowering millage when valuations increase due to HB920, passed in 1976.
- Outside Mills Voted mills that are approved by voters. These mills are called outside because they are outside of the Ohio state constitution. This millage is subject to reduction factors.
- **Inside Mills** millage 'guaranteed' by the Ohio State Constitution. This millage is NOT subject to reduction factors.
- 20 Mill Floor current minimum level of millage a district can have effective millage reduced to.



REDUCTION FACTOR: AN EXAMPLE

Home Value	Assessed Value (35%)	Effective Mills	Mill Factor	Property	Tax Revenue
\$100,000	\$35,000	41.45	0.001	(\$1,450.75

AMOUNT COLLECTED DOES NOT CHANGE

WITH INCREASE

Effective millage decreases as assessed values increase

MILLAGE CALCULATOR

1 Mill (\$35)

Number of Mills being levied

*\$100,000 multiplier of home value

1 Mill (\$35) x 3 mills x 3 (\$300,000) = \$315 annually

BONDS VS. LEVIES

BOND

for new buildings, building improvement, or other capital improvement.

- Can be up to 40 years depending on type of project.
- Think of this as a mortgage that you take out to purchase a home.

LEVIES

for operating expenses, permanent improvements, and other various purposes.

- Can be limited in duration and brought back to voters for approval
- Can be 'permanent' or in perpetuity

PRIMARY LEVY TYPES

MILLAGE-BASED

valuation to determine how much revenue will be generated by a mill. Then the number of mills is tied to the amount of funds needed to operate for a period of time.

EMERGENCY

These are 'fixed sum' or are tied to a specific dollar amount needed.

SUBSTITUTE

This is a levy that converts from an Emergency Levy. Substitute levies can be renewed

FACTORS THAT IMPACT PLANNING

- 20 mill floor status
- Property tax appraisal and triennial update timelines
- District demographics
- Changes in law

LEGISLATION IMPACTING SCHOOL FUNDING

HB96

- Line Item Veto Overrides:
 - Legislature has overridden Gov. DeWine's line item veto regarding:
 - Substitute, Replacement, and Emergency levies are no longer allowed after 90 days.
 - Substitute and Emergency levies now count towards the 20 mill floor.
 - Potentially bringing back a 40% cash balance cap
- Current Legislation being considered:
 - **HB186** would limit the amount of inside millage growth to inflation.

Understanding school levies

Funds generated from school tax levies compose a significant part of financing for Ohio schools. This fact sheet is designed to address the most frequently asked questions about school tax issues in Ohio. The information is of a general nature. Readers should seek the advice of legal counsel with specific legal problems or questions.

How are school districts financed?

School districts in Ohio are financed with a combination of federal, state and local funds. At the state level, school districts receive funding from the Ohio Department of Education's (ODE) general revenue funds and Ohio Lottery profits. At the local level, school districts receive funding from locally levied property taxes. School districts also can receive funding from income taxes approved by voters.

What is a property tax levy?

A property tax levy is the collection of taxes charged on the value of property. Each district must follow a process described in Ohio law in order for taxes to be levied on property within the district.


Boards of education propose additional local tax revenues by board resolution. Generally, school districts can place a levy on the ballot up to two times per year on specified election dates, aligning with the primary election in March or May and the general election in November. A third election date in August is available only if a district is under a fiscal emergency. If a majority of voters in an election approve the tax, county officials charge and collect the tax under the terms specified in the tax levy proposal. The collected funds are then disbursed to the district. When a levy is placed on the ballot, it must identify as its objective a legally defined school district purpose.

What types of property can be taxed?

Real property subject to taxation includes the buildings and land held by individuals or businesses. Real property is divided into two classes: Class I (residential and agricultural) and Class II (commercial, industrial and all other real property). Public utility personal property is also taxed.
