



TAKING BACK POWER

- Local elections are your most powerful way to make change for at least three reasons:
 - School board members, municipal and county officers, and state legislators can pass laws and policies that help protect your community from bad federal actions.
 - You and your group can directly impact the outcome. Many local elections will be decided by hundreds of votes. Some will be decided by one vote.
 - Every time an extremist loses a local election, it sends a big message. There are over 100,000 school board and city council seats on the ballot in 2025.



The Madison Local School District's proposed tax levy, which early unofficial results showed voters were split 50-50 on, failed, according to official election results from the Butler County Board of Elections released on May 22.

The measure will raise \$88.1 million for construction of a new school for grades 5-8, as well as repairs to existing elementary school buildings.

ELYRIA, Ohio — More than three weeks after Election Day, the Avon Lake City School District's \$88.1 million bond issue has officially been approved.

Issue 16 passed at the ballot box on May 6, but by just 20 votes — a margin of only 0.28%.

Under Ohio law, the result was subject to an automatic recount. According to the Lorain County Board of Elections, Issue 16 passed, 3,531 to 3,511.

Voting in Ohio

- Rules have changed for absentee voting in recent years. Make sure you know how to drop off ballots for relatives or friends.
 - A disabled voter may select any person of their choosing to deliver their ballot,
 other than their employer or an officer in their union.
 - The person delivering the ballot for a family member or disabled voter must complete an attestation form at the county board of elections office
- There will be a voter purge on September 23, 2025. That list contains 352,389 voters eligible who will be removed from the rolls.
- There could be changes related to mail-in voting at the federal level in the future.
- Gerrymandering disenfranchises voters by limiting the voting power of people across many categories. (Political affiliation, race, socio-economic status, etc.)

Update on Maps

- Under the process approved in 2018, state lawmakers get the first crack at drawing a map. If lawmakers can approve a draft with 60% majorities in both chambers, and the governor signs it, that's the map. They've got until the end of September.
- ACLU Ohio

- If lawmakers can't get there, the Ohio Redistricting Commission gets the pen. There are seven members and to approve a map they need two members from both major parties to vote yes. Five of the commission's seven members are Republicans. They've got until the end of October.
- If the commission deadlocks, mapmaking returns to the legislature. But this time, they only need simple majority support to approve a map. They face additional criteria like an explicit prohibition on benefiting a party or candidate and limiting community splits. They have to finish their work by November 30.
